





It is my great pleasure to welcome you to the fourth Media & Learning Conference organised in our ministry since the conference first began in 2010. This is a unique event which brings together practitioners and policy makers from different parts of Europe and beyond to discuss the role of media in our rapidly evolving education and training landscape.

The theme for this year's conference is 'Equipping Learners for Open, Creative Learning Futures' and points to the responsibility which all of us share to explore new and innovative ways in which to make learning more relevant, more ubiquitous and more open. This year almost 350 entries were received from 37 countries, a record number of entries pointing to a very high standard so we are all looking forward to seeing who the winners will be.

I hope that you enjoy your participation in Media & Learning 2013 and that you find plenty of opportunities to enhance your network and gather new ideas for your work. I also hope that you have an opportunity to enjoy Brussels particularly during this pre-Christmas season when there are lots of opportunities to enjoy seasonal fare.


Finnish Society on Media Education
