US report on emerging technologies

The [NMC Horizon Report](#) 2012 Higher Education Edition is a collaborative effort between the NMC and the EDUCAUSE Learning Initiative (ELI). This ninth edition describes annual findings from the NMC Horizon Project, a decade-long research project designed to identify and describe emerging technologies likely to have an impact on learning, teaching, and creative inquiry in higher education. Six emerging technologies are identified across three adoption horizons over the next one to five years, as well as key trends and challenges expected to continue over the same period, giving campus leaders and practitioners a valuable guide for strategic technology planning.



Online access to great educational video from TED-Ed?

The recent launch of TED-Ed is creating a lot of interest. Inspired by the Khan Academy, this initiative aims to capture and amplify the voices of great educators around the world. Based on the relatively simple idea of offering tools to teachers to capture and distribute their best lessons on video and teaming up these teachers with animators - this initiative could provide terrific learning material. As always - the devil is going to be in the detail as the initiators get to grip with the specifications and requirements of real learners, can they move beyond the superficial to provide really effective learning resources? Teachers and trainers from 5 countries take part in video workshop

12 teachers and trainers from Finland, Romania, UK, Ireland and Italy took part in the March 2012 edition of the training course, "Using Video to Support Lifelong Learning". This week-long residential training course which is organised by ATiT and takes place in Leuven is aimed at educational practitioners who would like to find out more about creating and using video materials to support their work. During the week, participants worked in teams to create their own 3-minute educational video clip which were then presented to an invited audience on Friday 23 March. Workshop in Spain on creating your own video

A large number of Spanish kindergarten teachers who were new to the use of video in the classroom took part in a workshop organised recently by CECE in Madrid on 22-24 March 2012. This workshop, entitled 'How to create and upload videos for educational purposes' involved Steven Ronsijn from Sint-Lievenscollege Gent (Belgium), the MEDEA Jury Special Award Winner in 2008 with the entry [Anti-anti](#). Workshop in France on web documentaries



A team from Vidéoscop - Université de Lorraine (formerly Université Nancy 2) in collaboration with the DTU AUNEGE organised a very successful workshop on [designing and using a web documentary as a learning resource](#) in Paris on 15-16 March. This workshop included online preparation and a day and half of face-to-face workshop sessions during which 23 lecturers and staff from ICT and audio-visual departments in French universities worked in groups to design a scenario for a web documentary on the theme 'men/women' and to then realise their scenario using a basic authoring tool. Input from [MEDEA finalist](#) Marion Stevens from the Dutch Open University formed part of the programme when Marion spoke about her experience of making the documentary "Amy Roloff".

Good advice on using narrative to improve podcasts

The Online Journalism Blog publishes comments and analysis on developments in online journalism and online news and recently published some sound advice on how to borrow narrative techniques used by journalists to engage listeners. It highlights the value of hooking listeners with a good story at the start, then using different techniques to bring the story up-to-date and finally at how style and structure can be used to add extra interest. Building Virtual Exhibitions with Video from European Archives

The EUscreen project promotes the use of television content to explore Europe's rich and diverse cultural history. Up to now it has already created access to over 15,000 items of

programme content and information originating from the rich archives of most European public broadcasters and audio-visual archives. The vast majority of EUscreen content has been selected to explore topics such as arts and culture, being European, disasters, education and so on.



During the last phase of this EU-funded project, an important new functionality has been added to the portal, a functionality that allows target users (in the first place researchers, content providers and educators) to curate content from the repository and to re-use this content in new and customised contexts.

The Virtual Exhibition Builder has the following functions: it acts in the first place as a media library where it stores the media files the user has assigned to a Virtual Exhibition (VE), then there is the actual Editor of the media assets, and a publisher of the VE. A nice additional aspect is the facility to collaborate on a VE.

The editor allows setting up of VEs using different template views or lay outs. VE pages can contain (hyper)text and media (bookmarked items from the EUscreen repository: video, images, audio, PDF). Video clips that are added to the VE page, can further be edited or annotated: tags can be added to the video timeline to link it to text, the video itself can also be cut, a thumbnail for the video can be selected or a new name assigned. Text can be edited by adding links to text parts: links can be made with video tags or to an external website.

The way the virtual exhibition looks can be changed by using themes with different visual styles that can be customised. A credits page, which lists all the media files used in the virtual exhibition, is created automatically, with links to the original sources on the EUscreen portal. A page called Curator's Corner is created automatically for each exhibition, containing all the notes of the creators.

Editing and creating a virtual exhibition can be done together even at a distance: in the user collaboration view users can add members as collaborators. Specific access rights can be given to collaborators for example to edit the exhibition or to just view it. The Activity view lists activities of the members in your exhibition. You can see for example if someone has added new content on a page.

A preview function allows a visual check of the different pages before publishing. When you create an exhibition, it is set by default as "Private", meaning that only the creator and the collaborators who are part of the exhibition building team can access and view it. As soon as the status of the virtual exhibition is changed to "Public" the VE will appear on the Exhibitions page of the EUscreen portal. Virtual exhibitions are an easy to use tool for building classroom scenarios or for learner activities that involve re-use of archived video.

Research meets schools with CSP@scuola

The Italian organisation [CSP](#) has a long tradition of collaboration with schools: from "Growing up in Torino" a 1999 project for connecting fifty city schools using videoconference, to [Dschola](#) a regional network of secondary schools supporting innovative use of ICT.

Nowadays, the schools' infrastructures are almost deployed and CSP has decided to directly support the skills development of students in the fields of ICT, proposing real state-of-the-art applications to them. In addition, CSP is interested in working with young researchers, providing them with support for their theses and study grants.

CSP@scuola is a project devoted to the transfer of technological skills aimed at building real working prototypes ready for use. The initiative started in 2011, and has been developed by CSP, in collaboration with the Institute Fauser of Novara (IT). This project using distance tutoring creates a direct channel between the world of technological innovation and high schools.

In the first phase of the project, the researchers presented their different activities and students had the opportunity to choose from a range of possible innovative topics. Participation in the project is voluntary and extra curriculum, but it will be evaluated and included in the student portfolio.

The students decided to work on Connected TV and microUAV – Unmanned Aerial Vehicles – with the help of CSP researchers and their teachers. The second phase is theoretical, in which tutors prepared some video lessons and slides: over a period of two months, students asked questions and carried out exercises. In the third phase which has just begun, the tutors are offering new ideas and fostering the development of specific projects also in collaboration with local actors.

The training model is blended learning, through distance learning, in a continuous exchange of information based on a platform developed by CSP within the [SVEA project](#) – a platform designed with a social learning approach – and face-to-face meetings. Work is in progress and the presentation of results is expected in May.

An additional Special MEDEA Jury 2012 Prize may also be awarded at the discretion of the MEDEA Jury.

Entry forms are available in English, French, German, Italian, Spanish and Polish while entry materials are invited in any language. Entry to this competition is free and prizes of hardware and/or software will be awarded along with the MEDEA Statuette and commemorative medals.

WebDox - Conference, exhibition and labs about Interactive Web Documentaries



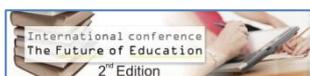
